# <u>NORTH KYME MEMORIES - (An extract from the talk given to NK schoolchildren in 1998</u> by Mrs Nora Everard)

"The scouts have come and gone like a lot of things. There was a bakers shop which is now the Coach House cafe. This had originally been a public house called The Chequers so there were two pubs side by side in the middle of the village. That was strange. There was another public house called The Red Cow on the road to South Kyme, they must have thought we were thirsty people in Kyme!

We had a blacksmith to shoe the horses but now all the horses have gone. There was a tiny field opposite the Plough Inn called the Pound. If a horse got out of its field and came into the village someone would shoo it into the Pound and the farmer would know where to look for his escaped animal.

In the village there were cottages with thatched roofs, the last one, opposite the Post Office, was pulled down for a brick house to be built and another one where the school playing field is, just crumbled away. Before the war we had a tennis court and bowling green in the village just opposite the church gate. Now a bungalow is built there and we have indoor bowling in the village hall."

#### VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE AGM - 5th FEBRUARY

John Goddard declared the meeting open and welcomed those attending. There were 19 people present which included the committee, a rather poor turnout considering that every house in the village had received a notification of the meeting.

The balance sheet for the year showed that we produced ten separate events in that time, apart from the regular bingo, bowls, etc.etc. Our balance showed a clear profit of £1708 and is a measure of our success, especially as last year the profit was £1200 and in 1999 was only £750. This is all due to the hard work of your committee and the increased support of the public at our events. Despite the small attendance at the meeting, three new members joined the committee to fill vacant posts. They are very welcome!

#### JUBILEE MEETING - 13th FEBRUARY

The parish council had called a meeting to discuss the wishes of the residents concerning Jubilee Celebrations. There were only 13 people present, but there were quite a few ideas suggested for the day. Monday 3rd June was decided upon with the school field and playground as the venue. This was thought to be safer for games and for a 'street' party to take place. A barbecue and dance or disco plus a talent contest during the evening in the village hall are also planned. Mr & Mrs Kingsbury have kindly offered to pay for a 'bouncy castle' for the younger ones. Glynn Pout has offered to co-ordinate plans and already has a small team of willing helpers. #### PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - 21 st JANUARY

The meeting was told that three trees have now been planted. One each in the churchyard, near the stone and on the common. A suggestion was made that councillors could do an annual inspection of the village and a date in the summer is to be agreed. The highway and planning department have nothing planned for North Kyme we were told. The next meeting will be on Wednesday 27th March.

# PARISH COUNCIL NEWS (Meeting held 27th May)

The meeting opened with the chairman presenting a bouquet of flowers to Mrs Joan Townsend with many thanks for her service as secretary. Mrs Judith Johnson was then welcomed as the new secretary. The council were told that the Jubilee medals for the children had been ordered and would bear the inscription "North Kyme Parish Council". Anyone in receipt of a State pension can also apply for a free commemorative medal. (Apply to Joan Townsend 861164). Donations for Jubilee Day from the council were agreed and the chairman offered to pay for the hire of the school field. A walk of inspection around the village by the parish council is planned for week commencing 22nd July, hopefully with the county surveyor, a member of the public then asked the council if it was possible to request a 'hidden dip' sign on the Drove road as there had already been one accident at that point. The council agreed to approach the highways department. It was also discussed if a community policeman based at Ruskington could possibly attend some Council meetings. Finally, the Council were asked if an application could be made to the Catalyst scheme to provide funds for both a 'conservation area' at the end of Mill Lane on the triangle and a footpath leading to it from the village.

NB: The latest news is that the Parish Council's bid for funding has met with provisional approval and is being processed.

# CATALYST FUND

The fund is a new one for selected areas in Lincs. It can provide grants that will benefit the local community. Two areas have been chosen for this pilot scheme and North Kyme is lucky enough to be eligible. The Village Hall Committee have been successful in their application for two 'marquees' with extra tables and seating. This will be a huge benefit to any event that is at the mercy of the weather. The 'marquees' will be available for any other groups in the parish who wish to borrow them. We are very hopeful that we will have some of the equipment in time for the Summer Show.

# MILLENNIUM BOOK CABINET

The oak cabinet will be made for Mr and Mrs Corne by a friend who lives in Hinckley. Audrey and her husband are taking the book to be fitted for it's case(!) and have generously offered a large donation towards its cost. Book and cabinet may be ready for display at the Summer Show.

# JUBILEE MONTAGE

A fine piece of needlework for the Golden Jubilee celebrations has been donated by Mrs Janet Armitage. We would like this to form the centre of a photographic montage from the village celebrations on June 3rd. This would be kept on display in the village hall as a permanent reminder for many years to come. # PARISH COUNCIL NEWS (Meeting held 19th August)

The meeting opened with the chairman welcoming local councillor Mr D Dickinson. Parish councillors and the Area Highways Manager had taken part in a village inspection on 24th July. A follow-up letter had been received from the highways manager and is reproduced in part below.

### A153 Main Street

1. A number of manhole, gully and valve covers are too low and causing excessive traffic noise.

2. The speed limit sign at the North end requires resetting and the derestriction sign replacing.

3. There is water standing outside No.67 and an additional gully is required.

4. The gully outside No.43 blocks regularly and may require a new trapped gully pot to be installed.

5. Repairs to the carriageway in the vicinity of No.9 are required.

6. A request was made for a new foot way from the end of the foot way at the North end of the village to Mill Lane. This has been submitted for assessment and I will let you know the outcome in due course.

7. I will ask the Road Safety Partnership to look at the Drove in respect of forward visibility to ascertain if the road markings are correct.

### Church Lane

1. Problems with flooding in the vicinity of The Plough. It was agreed that there was no longer an available outfall for the drainage to discharge into. Therefore it is proposed to construct a soak away in the verge where the seat now stands. Although not a total solution this should ease the problem significantly.

2. The general condition of the surfacing of Church Lane is poor and requires attention.

Another item discussed at the meeting was the Post Office closure and we were told that the PO are still looking for an outlet in the village.

The parish council then discussed the Conservation Group (more overleaf) and finally ended the meeting by voting unanimously to donate £75 towards the running cost of the North Kyme News this year. (*Thank you - Editor*)

### NORTH KYME CONSERVATION PROJECT GROUP

This project has been awarded £3450 by the Catalyst Fund for a conservation area at 'the triangle' which lies between Mill Lane and the Main Road junction at the North end of the village. This piece of land is ideal for conservation purposes and could be a lovely asset as well as a haven for endangered wild flowers and water birds. Our youngsters from the school would learn about nature at a very early age and if we could obtain an extended footpath to the triangle that would be even better and safer for everyone to enjoy.

A project group already formed from parish councillors needs some input from volunteers who are interested in conservation issues and can lend a helping hand. They will be getting guidance from the Wildlife Trust and the Conservation Trust and volunteers will be given training and a minimal attendance allowance. This project is something really worthwhile and will benefit all of us, don't delay, phone Judith Johnson on 861293.
